ESCA Goes Karting

On Tuesday Jan 24th we had our first **ESCA** Kart Race of the '23 season. It was a good turn out with 10 drivers attending. The format was a 12 lap practice session, 12 lap qualifying and a 14 lap standing start final. The competition was tight with about ³/₄ of a second separating 1st thru 10th in each session.

Eric Lundy set the top time in practice with a 23.804, Steve Rossiter set a time of 22.625 in qualifying for pole, beating Wolfgang Obergin by just 0.047 seconds for 2nd and Gary Shannon took 3rd with a 22.857. Starting on pole was a big advantage and I was able to create a gap on lap one and hold on to it for the win. There was an intense battle in the rest of the pack with Wolfgang Obergin taking 2nd, John Schliemann finishing 3rd, 4th thru 10th were Craig Hammond, Eric Lundy, Marc Brady, Brent Werder, Gary Shannon, Bryan Burnett and Charley Sawyer. Gary Shannon set the fastest lap of the race at 22.668. The next event is **Feb 28th**, hope to see you there















My Profile by Ed Biglin

I grew up in a suburb of Washington D.C., commuting downtown to high school in my first car, a green 1956 Ford. Bought it used in 1961 for a few hundred bucks – great car with a V8, power steering (unusual



in those days) and 3 on the column. It was also the first car marketed for "safety" (by Robert McNamara of Vietnam fame) – it had a padded dashboard which leaked dried foam rubber out of cracks in the plastic and seatbelts snaking in impossible tangles across the seats (retractors hadn't been invented yet, I guess). Took that car to college in New England, where I had to hide it off campus because the rules didn't allow underclassmen to have cars (ask me some time about the other rules of that benighted, all-male institution).

Came to California in 1967 to go to graduate school in



Berkeley – stayed in Berkeley for 47 years because I was lucky enough to get a tenuretrack faculty job at Saint Mary's

College – which allowed me to indulge my love of the Sierras for backpacking, rock climbing and hiking. But no hope of supporting a car in the early years on my salary as a teaching assistant – so rode Suzuki motorcycles until one too many close call – where I had to lay it down to slide under a left-turning truck – got me off the bike and into a 1965 Dodge Dart (remember the "typewriter drive" automatic transmission?). Great car, a real quality control error by Chrysler because it just ran and ran and didn't break. But boring – so I celebrated my first real paid teaching job by buying a used 1969 Alfa Romeo 1750 GTV.

That car was not boring – I thought it was the prettiest car I'd ever seen and it handled like a dream. I drove it on track days with the Alfa Club, and Autocrosses with SCCA. And also, it did break, regularly. I became a frequent visitor to the Parts Department at the Alfa dealer in Berkeley. My favorite was doing a tune-up. It had mechanical fuel injection (a system that did not last long in the automotive world) which had a "temperature compensation actuator" rather than a choke – a

tube filled with some goo that expanded and contracted and regularly leaked. To do a tune-up, you had to take that actuator out and replace it with a "dummy actuator" which had a hole in the center that allowed a long, thin screwdriver to be inserted and turn a tiny screw at the bottom. You closed the screw, then opened it a half turn, and then started the engine (if it wasn't cold). Then, you drove it to see if it would shift into second while idling, without bucking. If it bucked, you opened the screw another quarter turn and tried again until it worked. I spent a lot of weekends with my feet sticking out from under the bumper, or my hindquarters out from under the hood.

The arrival of a son and the adding of a second job writing sections of the Michelin Guide to California on the Sierras meant that my new 1984 Toyota Land Cruiser had to replace the Alfa (no real room for a kid seat in the GTV). I was sorry to see it go, but the need to remodel two junker houses in Berkeley, tend to my career and raise my son meant that my driving was completely functional for many years. Didn't get back into it until the aforementioned son took up street racing at 17, which seemed to me a very bad idea, so I worked with him to put together a purpose-built autocross car (old Honda CRX with replacement Vtech B16 engine) to get him off the streets and driving again with me in SCCA.



Retired from academic administration (Dean, Chief Technology Officer) at St. Marys in 2012, and taught part-time until 2018. Bought my current car, a 2002 Honda S2000, when it was 5 years old, and started Autocrossing

with my son in SCCA, and then after moving up to Oakmont, with **ESCA**, which I liked much better than SCCA (stand around for 4 hrs, work for an hour and drive for 3 minutes). **ESCA** has been a delight – open, friendly and helpful folks, lots of driving and lots of pizza at meetings. I'm also a Park Steward in Sugarloaf Ridge and manage the Progressives Club in Oakmont.



New Sports Car Club Opens Field

Club Welcomed



There are no short cuts to fame and fortune as a racing driver, just hard work and practice.

Back in 1955, '56, '57, and '58, when Dan Gurney, Skip Hudson and I traveled to all sports car events with my Porsche Carrera GT, I remember we would rent one motel room, take the mattress from the bed and throw it on the floor. Then we'd flip a coin to see who would sleep on the box springs and who on the floor. This doesn't sound romantic, and many thousand budding drivers falled where only one Dan Gurney succeeded.
