

Unearned Pole Position

You know how sometimes you're coming up to a red light and there are cars in one lane but the other is wide open? I call that "unearned pole position". This was kind-of like that. As readers of this column know, the best way to win the Main is to qualify on the pole, and that's what I set out to do.

During practice we were on Max Power, having a great time, and I managed to post one of my fastest laps ever. So far so good. But during qualifying, I was just getting my tires warmed up when my kart died on lap 4, causing a caution flag.

When we got going again, Steve Rossiter quickly moved to the top of the time chart, and I set out to catch him, but then my kart glitched again bringing out another caution. Apparently a few of the karts don't like Power Level 4. At some point they may have dropped us to Power Level 3, but for whatever reason I never got going again. I figured "oh well, that's racing".

But the race officials knew it was their computer that caused









the mayhem in qualifying. They knew some of us got screwed. So they decided to combine the qual and practice sessions to determine the qualifying order. That put me in the first kart! Unearned Pole Position. If I won, that would be the headline.

I started from the lead and never looked back. If I had, I would have seen "Rat Fink" Johnny Schlieman diving inside of outside polesitter Steve Rossiter into Turn 1. They battled hard for three laps, then Johnny got clear in second.

I saw on the time board that Johnny was turning the fastest lap times. He was watching my every move, tracking my line. He started reeling me in and pretty soon he was knocking on my back door. You can't really pass at K1 without using the bumper, but he didn't dump me and I managed to hold on for the win.

After getting dive-bombed at the start, Rossiter then came under attack by his off-track buddy Steve Habkirk. They battled hard for many laps but Rossiter held him off for third place. Behind them, Ron Cox was happy to finish on the lead lap in fifth. It was one of the first times when everyone finished on the lead lap.

F1 fan Andy Ferrara qualified at the back, normal for a rookie kart driver. He expressed the difficulty in passing. I told him "Eight tires turn better than four...eight tires and a wall turn best of all". He took it to heart and passed Gary Shannon







for sixth. Hopefully he didn't rough him up too bad. Gary was fast in practice and qual, as usual, but in the Main he got a kart with no speed in it and couldn't go anywhere.

Karting has been a good consolation for our lost autocross season. It scratches the competitive itch. It focusses the mind and the world disappears as you enter a pure flow state. Come on out next time!

2023 All British Motor Show

The morning of October 15th did not start well. Preparing to leave Glen Ellen at 6:15 am it was dark and foggy. For once I'd prepared for less than ideal weather by putting up the top of the Triumph the night before. The thing is a 56 year old English car doesn't necessarily have the best weather protection or functioning wipers. Before I'd gone a couple miles the problems with a wet windscreen were obvious. The oncoming headlights made it much worse. Highway 37 from Sears Point to Vallejo was almost daunting enough to make me want to give up trying to get to Blackhawk Automotive Museum.

The Mini Owners of America were hosting their 33rd annual All British Car Show at Blackhawk and I'd signed up to bring my '67 TR4A. In past years it has been grand fun and always interesting. This year the featured marque was Triumph. However that was for motorcycles. The feature car marque was the Austin Healey Sprite.

There was a smaller turnout than in past years but still pretty remarkable. Of course there were plenty of Sprites and Triumph bikes. Also ten E-Type Jags, a plethora of various versions of Minis and only two of the current version. Morgans and MGs were there in abundance, two Land Rovers, one Rolls Royce, some Cortinas, Escorts, an array of Lotus, three Jensen Interceptors all owned by the same guy, and three Astons... but all recent ones. Among my favorites was a 1959 1.5 liter Riley saloon.



In peak condition, the maximum velocity they're capable of is something like 25 MPH. Not much of a threat in hillclimbs or at the Goodwood Revival.

I suppose it shouldn't be a surprise that there were no Lagondas there. Ditto Damliers, Vanden Plas, HRGs, and other oddities. There was, however, one TVR. Apparently it garnered only a single vote; from its owner I presume.
